Report: Ukraine Zoos Emergency Fund, 2023 activities

January 2024

Introduction

Russia invaded Ukraine on 24 February 2022. Within days of the war starting, EAZA established the Ukraine Zoos Emergency Fund with a dedicated <u>Fund Protocol</u> and <u>Claims List</u>. EAZA's Candidate for Membership programme, which mentors zoos and aquariums seeking to achieve our Standards, includes three zoos in Ukraine: Kyiv Zoo, Kharkiv Zoo and Mykolaiv Zoo. It was agreed that funds raised could be used to assist these institutions and other Ukrainian zoos to continue to provide food and care to animals in conditions of relative welfare and safety, as well as providing support for care staff and management at the zoos. The Fund enabled individuals and organisations to donate to EAZA as a central collection point. A <u>dedicated webpage</u> was set up and various communications were shared on how to donate.

The Ukraine Zoos Emergency Fund provides direct financial assistance to institutions as well as coordinating efforts with the Association of Zoos of Ukraine (AZU) who are able to receive money from EAZA and distribute to those most in need. With the war sadly entering its second year, and no immediate peace in sight, EAZA recognised the need to move to Phase 2: Secondary crisis phase as outlined in the Fund protocol. The Fund will provide money that allows for longer term care of animals until there is a possibility for recovery. This may include the care of animals originating in Ukrainian zoos at facilities outside Ukraine.

EAZA commits to full transparency on the collection and distribution of funds for Ukraine, with 100% of donations going to help Ukrainian zoos and aquariums. This report builds on the <u>first</u> report provided in April 2023. It summarises activities throughout the 2023 period.

Donations and Spending

Since the EAZA Ukraine Zoos Emergency Fund started there has been:

Donated: €1,983,824.56Spent: €1,867,276.51

Resulting in €116,548.05 remaining at the end of 2023. The majority of donations were received in the first few months after the war started (see Figure 1), with a total of €1,743,898.96 donated in 2022 and €239.925.60 in 2023.

Small donations from individuals continued to be received every month throughout 2023. EAZA specifically <u>called for renewed support in February 2023</u>, one year after the war started, and in November 2023, to help focus donations pre the winter period. The November fundraiser included a <u>range of support materials</u> provided by Ukraine zoos and the EAZA Executive Office, as well as a special offer from EAZA Corporate Member Petjes World to donate a proportion of every plush toy sold. One hundred percent of the summer auction of books from the closure of the EAZA library also went towards the Fund.

Regular meetings are held by a Ukraine Fund group to review new donations and agree spending. A due diligence process is in place to check the validity of those requesting support, develop cooperation agreements, and agree reporting on use of funds.




Figure 2: Number donating organisations per country

Individuals across the world have made 11,771 donations so far, with many making multiple donations (see list of names here). Two hundred and twenty EAZA Members and other organisations worldwide have made donations, again sometimes multiple ones. The spread of donations from organisations per country is given in Figure 2.

In 2023 the Fund not only provided direct financial aid to institutions but also paid for six generators to be transported into Ukraine and distributed to institutions.

EAZA is also grateful to all Members who have arranged their own aid for zoos in Ukraine. Wherever possible EAZA has sought to combine and coordinate with these efforts so that maximum benefits can be received by as many organisations as possible.

Table 1 shows how the funds were distributed across different institutions in 2023. The highest level of spend was to the large EAZA Candidate for Membership zoos and zoos who are members of AZU.

The different organisations provided receipts, photo and video evidence of how the funds have been spent. A sample of their images is provided below.

Amongst the Ukrainian zoos there has been a continuing strong preference to support each other internally and move animals in need of extra care or accommodation to other Ukrainian zoos. To date, there has not been a large need to relocate animals from the supported organisations to zoos outside Ukraine. At the same time, EAZA has been in contact with a group of animal rescue organisations and assisted with information regarding relocations from other zoos and animal rescue centres to zoos outside Ukraine when needed.

The Fund remains open however, the majority has now been spent out. Calls for donations will continue and EAZA remains committed to supporting zoos and aquariums in Ukraine care for their animals and staff.




Figure 7: Animal interactions with those affected by the war, Kyiv Zoo
